

Reflecting the Light

January 6 has a special name: **Epiphany**. The word *epiphany* means to "show forth" or "shine." On Epihany we hear the story of the magi. (You can read it in Matthew 2:1-12.) The magi were wise people who studied the skies and saw a bright star shining in the sky. They followed it to find the child that God had sent to be a special leader. Prophets had said this leader would be like a light shining in the darkness, showing people God's way.

The magi didn't belong to the same community or country as Jesus did, but they saw the star and believed it was announcing something important. They presented their gifts to Jesus; then they went back to their homeland. That was the start of the light of God's love spreading out to all people.

The magi brought gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Here are some gifts that we might offer to Christ, by sharing them with others: a firm handshake to a shaky soul, a kind word to a lonely person, a warm smile to the disheartened, a sincere concern for someone troubled, a feeling of compassion for the neglected, a comforting thought for the bereaved, a word of witness to help a seeking soul.

Jesus' Baptism and Ours

Baptism is a sign of the relationship God initiates with us. We love because God first loves us. Water was used in Jesus' baptism, which we remember this year on January 7, and it is still used in baptism today. If you have been baptized, find out all you can about that day. Where were you baptized? When did it happen? Who was there, and what happened? Write down what you learned. Now read the story of Jesus' baptism in Matthew 3:13-17 and compare your stories. What was similar? What was different? The main thing that all baptisms share is the water and the word of God: you are my beloved child.

The Baptism of Jesus

Then Jesus came from Galilee to the Jordan to John, to be baptized by him.

John would have prevented him, saying, "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?" But Jesus answered him, "Let it be so now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness." Then he consented. And when Jesus was baptized, immediately he went up from the water, and behold, the heavens were opened to him, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and coming to rest on him; and behold, a voice from heaven said, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased."

The Confession of St. Peter On Which the Church Doth Stand ~ January 18

Peter was the first of the disciples to confess Jesus as God—a proclamation that would be critical to our Lord's ministry and the later ministry of his Church. Jesus responds to him, saying, "Blessed are you, Simon bar-Jonah, for flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but My Father, who is in heaven," and later, "You are Peter, and on this Rock I will build My church."

Our Lord Jesus shows us here that this confession came from God himself, demonstrating that faith is not the product of human wisdom or reason but is instead revealed and given by God.

Peter, the rough fisherman and brother of Andrew, is one of the most prominent characters in the Gospels, often known for his stumbling, impetuous, and rash behavior. After all, it was Peter who attempted to walk on the sea, Peter who wished to build three tabernagles on the mountain during the Transfiguration, and Peter who depied

three tabernacles on the mountain during the Transfiguration, and Peter who denied Jesus three times on the night that he was betrayed.

Yet Peter also risked his life for Jesus and his work, being sent out after Pentecost and remembered as one of the strongest leaders of the early Church. Although Scripture depicts Peter struggling with himself, contradicting his own beliefs, and acting spontaneously, our Lord's graciousness towards him reminds us that Jesus did not come to save the worthy but the weak and sinful.

Peter's confession of Jesus as Christ serves as an example of faith, the "rock" on which the Church is built. Through confessions like this, the Holy Spirit works to call, gather, and build the Church, sanctifying its believers. This day of St. Peter also reminds us that our Lord gives his Church the keys to the Kingdom and instructed Peter and the other disciples to be the early Church's pastors who would continue the confession of Christ throughout the ages. Through men like these our Lord continues to make himself known to his people through his Word and Sacraments.

So on this day of confession, we can thank our heavenly father that he used an ordinary person like Peter to proclaim his faith and build his Church.

A Brief History

A version of this festival dedicated to St. Peter and his confession has existed Since the fourth century. It was formerly called "the Chair of Peter," and the commemoration tended to honor Peter as the head of episcopal authority and focus on his position as a leader of the twelve disciples.

While the Roman Catholic Church and other Protestants have continued to observe this feast on its historic date in February, many Lutherans and others following the Reformation observed their primary commemoration of Peter on the January date. The main reason for this shift was a desire that the feast not fall during Lent so that it could be celebrated as a proper feast and conflict with Lenten observances.

Collect

Heavenly Father, Thou didst reveal to the Apostle Peter the blessed truth that Thy Son Jesus is the Christ: strengthen us, we beseech Thee, by the proclamation of this truth, that we too may joyfully confess that there is salvation in no one else; through the same Jesus Christ, Thy Son, Our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost: ever one God, world without end. Amen.

January 22nd is Sanctity of Human Life Day 40th Anniversary

On January 13, 1984, President Ronald Reagan issued a proclamation designating January 22nd as the first National Sanctity of Human Life Day, noting it was the 11th anniversary of Roe v. Wade, the Supreme Court ruling that legalized abortion in all 50 states.

In the case of Roe v. Wade, the US Supreme Court struck down state laws restricting abortions during the first six months of pregnancy. In the following decades, the debate has continued to rage between those who believe a woman has a right to

choose whether to continue a pregnancy and those who believe that aborting such a pregnancy is the murder of an unborn child.

January 2024 will commemorate the 40th year our nation has observed the sanctity of human life. However, the need to pray for a culture of life in our nation is still vitally important. Abortions continue to occur.

The day is traditionally marked as a holy day by the Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod as Sanctity of Human Life Sunday.

Prenatal Developmental Markers:

Day 1: Each single-cell zygote possesses its own unique genetic DNA signature identifying him or her as a distinct human being.

Day 14: Embryo has developed an irreversible top and bottom, front and back, left and right.

Day 18: Heart begins beating.

Day 23: Brain and spinal cord are formed.

Day 28: Baby has all his or her vital organs, arms, legs, and reproductive cells.

Day 50: When most mothers become aware of pregnancy, the infant has a complete skeleton and over 4,000 distinct anatomical parts, equaling 90% of structures found in adults.
