
CURRENT WISH LIST INCLUDES: New Guest Chairs in Pastor's Office

ST. MARK THE EVANGELIST

On April 25, the church celebrates St. Mark the Evangelist. He was not one of the 12 Apostles, but he was a disciple of Jesus and it was he who first put into writing the eye witness accounts of the life and times of Jesus, sometime around 65 AD.

St. Peter refers to Mark as his "son." Peter may have used this term to show his love for Mark, or

he may have used it because he was the one who baptized Mark. It is believed that Peter was the primary source for Mark's Gospel.

Mark traveled with Sts. Paul and Barnabas to spread the Good News about Jesus. During his imprisonment in Rome, Paul mentions Mark's concern for him and writes about how helpful Mark is in the ministry of helping others to believe in Jesus (Colossians. 4:10; 2 Timothy 4:11).

After serving with Peter in Rome, Mark founded the Church in Egypt and he became bishop of Alexandria. He died there sometime between the years 68-74 AD as a martyr for his belief in Jesus. His relics were eventually taken to Venice where they lie in the Basilica of St. Mark. He is the Patron Saint of the city.

Mark's Gospel is a lasting treasure for all believers. He wrote his Gospel to help people know that Jesus was the Son of God who suffered and died to save us from sin and death. When we read Mark's Gospel, we learn that to be a follower of Jesus, we, too, must be willing to make sacrifices, to "take up our cross and follow" (Mark 8:34) Jesus as he asks us to do.

The symbol for Mark is a lion with wings. That is because his Gospel begins with the story of John the Baptist, a "voice crying in the wilderness" (Mark 1:3), like the roaring of a lion. Mark's Gospel tells us about Jesus' royalty as God's Son, a kingship we share through our Baptism.

The Gospel of Mark concludes with the Lord's final greeting: "Go into the whole world and proclaim the Gospel" (Mk 16:15). Mark sees that Christian faith is something to be shared with others and never to be kept to ourselves. His life and Gospel remind us to share the Good News about Jesus with others.

Whose Is It Anyway?

If you have every bought or sold a house, you are acquainted with the concept of a "title search." Before you can sell your house, and before anyone else will feel comfortable putting down the money to buy it, you have to prove that you really own it. So a title company looks through the public records to ensure that you bought it from the person who really owned it, who bought it from the person who really owned it before that, all the way back to the earliest records of your state, including when your state was only a territory or colony of England.

Peak into a preschool classroom during playtime and you'll see a simplified version of this. A child starts playing with a ball, but another child says, "That's mine: I had it first."

You can't understand the Seventh Commandment without understanding this concept of ownership or title. As the Small Catechism puts it:

You shall not steal. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor's money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income.


Your neighbor's possessions are his: you don't have a right to take them. And likewise, your possessions are yours.

Ownership and property rights are foundational to any functioning society.

But there is something deeper to know about ownership, and that is the question of who has the title and ownership to you? Paul says, "Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price" (1 Cor. 6:19–20).

If you yourself are owned by God, then of course everything that you own, you really only possess by God's leave: all of it, at bottom, belongs to Him since you belong to Him. For you were bought with the blood of Christ.

This notion is the foundation of all Christian stewardship. It all belongs to God. It should all be used for things that bring honor to His name, blessings to our neighbors and the extension of His kingdom.

HOME & FAMILY THE LAST BOOK OF THE BIBLE

The Bible is an amazing book. Well, actually it is a collection of 66 amazing books. The Old Testament has 39 books and the New Testament has 27. Think about the longest book you have ever read. The Bible has 1189 chapters - if you read one chapter a day, it would take more than three years to read!

Sometimes people think of the Bible as a book they should start reading at the beginning, so many people have read Genesis, the first book of the Bible. They learn that God created the world and filled it with good things, but that the first humans couldn't follow the rules. So God's perfect creation was damaged and all things began to experience suffering and death.

The last book of the Bible tells a very different story. It records the visions of a man named John, who was living alone on the Island of Patmos. He talks about many things; some are troubling, but others are very beautiful. John describes a new kind of creation - a time when people will no longer feel pain or sorrow because they would be in god's presence.

Imagine for a moment what a perfect world would be like. The things that terrify us the most will be gone. The idea of a perfect world is what John was trying to describe in Revelation, where a new heaven and a new earth includes more than just people. It is not simply a spiritual world. It is this world, transformed, with all the good things kept. Read some verses from Revelation to explore some of John's visions. Read **Revelation 1:8**. It is saying God is our "A and Z," our beginning and end of all things - always has been and always will be.

Read **Revelation 5:11-12**. John says that many angels, living creatures, and elders are gathered around God's throne, all singing praises. Think of a time when you have heard a large group of people singing. How is it different from hearing just one person sing? What are some songs you would like to hear the angels sing around God's throne?

The Bible records more than 1200 promises and Revelation records many of them. Read **Revelation 7:16-17**. This promise is sometimes read at funerals or in other sad times. John is telling us about a time when we will no longer get hurt or become ill or feel sad or even experience death. Jesus will be our shepherd, guiding us, keeping us safe, and caring for our needs. Jobs today that are like shepherds might include parents, nurses, police, or maybe even pet owners. What can you do to be a caregiver for others?

Let's read through the entire Bible in one year! Here is the plan for April.

If you accidently miss a day, just double up the next day. Are you keeping up OK?
